Overview

Columbia University ranks second to last, following a string of investigations, classroom disruptions, and suspensions — just above its sister school, Barnard College.

Columbia ranks in the bottom 10 for “Comfort Expressing Ideas” and “Administrative Support,” and in the bottom 50 for “Self-Censorship.”

This near-bottom ranking reflects a campus where free expression is consistently undermined by administrative overreach, unclear policies, and limited student understanding of First Amendment principles. To begin reversing course, Columbia should revise its speech codes to earn a “green light” Spotlight rating, formally adopt a commitment to institutional neutrality, and limit administrative investigations to conduct that clearly falls outside the bounds of protected speech. Beyond policy, Columbia must work to rebuild trust by making clear — in both word and action — that it values open inquiry and will defend students’ and faculty members’ rights to express dissenting views without fear of punishment or censorship.
