Overview

Appalachian State University ranks 8 out of 257 schools in the 2026 College Free Speech Rankings with a score of 73, earning a C speech climate grade. The university earns a “green light” Spotlight rating and benefits from a University of North Carolina System adoption of the Chicago Statement and institutional neutrality — signaling strong written commitments to free expression.

Student perceptions are mixed. App State ranks in the top 50 for “Administrative Support,” suggesting confidence that leaders back open dialogue compared to other schools. In contrast, App State places in the bottom 25 on “Self-Censorship,” indicating many students feel pressure to keep quiet about controversial views.

Addressing the gap between policy and practice remains App State’s most pressing challenge. The university ranks 158 in “Openness” and a striking 253 in “Self-Censorship,” suggesting that many students are hesitant to express themselves despite strong institutional commitments. By strengthening orientation efforts and reinforcing the value of free inquiry throughout the semester, App State can better translate its written policies into a more open campus culture.

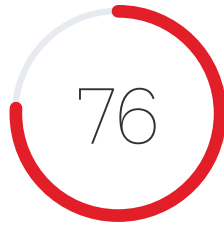
FIRE’s Spotlight database annually rates regulations on student expression based on the extent to which they restrict free speech.
