

Overview

The University of Virginia ranks 21 out of 257 schools in the 2026 College Free Speech Rankings with a score of 70, earning a C- speech climate grade. The university adopted institutional neutrality this year, complementing its long-standing "green light" Spotlight rating, yet it also absorbed a small penalty after an administrator threatened to remove a peaceful student protester from outside of their Judge Advocate General's Legal Center and School before reversing course.

Student perceptions are poor with UVA failing to rank in the top 100 for any area. UVA ranks in the bottom 50 for both "Comfort Expressing Ideas" and "Administrative Support," signaling relative unease and skepticism toward leadership despite strong written policies.

To close the gap between policy and perception, students must see their rights defended in both words and actions. UVA leadership should more clearly and proactively articulate the value of expressive rights, particularly during moments of controversy. In addition, UVA should incorporate robust First Amendment education into first-year orientation to help students understand not only their rights, but also where lawful expression ends and unprotected conduct begins.
